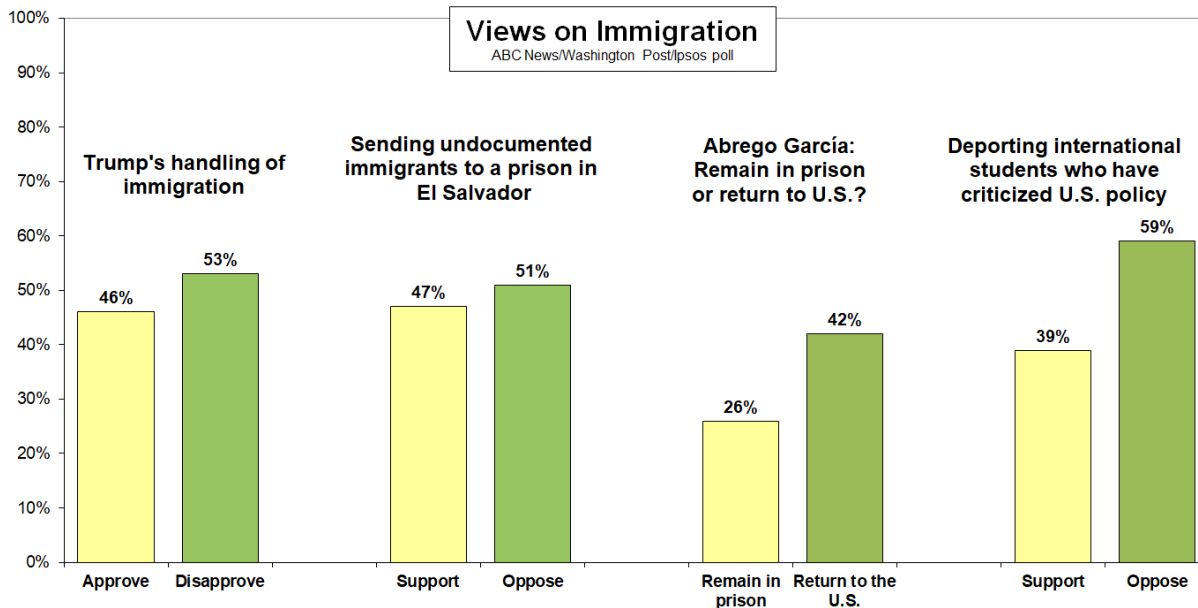


More Say Bring Back Abrego Garcia; Views are Mixed on Other Deportation Issues

Americans hold mixed views on Donald Trump's immigration policies, dividing on sending undocumented immigrants accused of gang membership to an El Salvador prison without a court hearing while mainly opposing deporting international students who criticize U.S. policy in the Middle East.

In the case of Kilmar Abrego Garcia, who was deported to El Salvador despite a court order prohibiting it, more say he should be returned to the United States than remain imprisoned in El Salvador, 42-26 percent. There's room for movement; three in 10 in this ABC News/Washington Post/Ipsos poll don't know enough about the case to say.

Overall, 46 percent approve of the way Trump is handling immigration, while 53 percent disapprove. On one hand that's a 4-point drop in approval from a Washington Post/Ipsos poll in February; on the other, it's Trump's best rating across seven issues tested in this survey, produced for ABC by [Langer Research Associates](#) with fieldwork by [Ipsos](#).



There's about an even division, moreover, on Trump's efforts to deport undocumented immigrants in general. Forty-eight percent say he's "going too far" in this regard, while 50 percent say he's either handling it about right (34 percent) or not going far enough (16 percent).

There's also a close split on deportation of suspected gang members to an El Salvador prison without a court hearing: Forty-seven support this action, with 51 percent opposed.

That result underscores animosity toward undocumented immigrants, as seen in contrast to views on deporting international students who have criticized U.S. policy in the Middle East: In this case, support for deportation drops to 39 percent, with 59 percent opposed.

PARTISANS – Partisanship is a strong factor. About nine in 10 Republicans approve of Trump's handling of immigration, vs. one in 10 Democrats; it's 45 percent among independents. Trump also wins approval on immigration from 93 percent of his 2024 voters, compared with 8 percent of those who voted for Kamala Harris. The difference is that he falls well short among 2024 nonvoters, who disapprove of Trump on immigration by 59-40 percent.

In another broad partisan gap, 85 percent of Democrats think Trump is "going too far" with deportations. Sixty percent of Republicans instead think he's handling this about right – and 27 percent say he's not going not far enough. Independents again fall in between.

Republicans' attitudes are not monolithic. Eighty-two percent support sending suspected gang members to a prison in El Salvador without a court hearing. Fewer, but still 70 percent, support deporting international college students who are critical of U.S. Mideast policy. Fewer still, 53 percent, say Abrego Garcia should remain in El Salvador, though just 14 percent favor his return, with the rest unsure.

Hispanic people disapprove of Trump's handling of immigration overall, by 67-32 percent. Men divide about evenly, while women disapprove by 58-41 percent. Approval on the issue ranges from 65 percent of people in rural areas to 45 percent in the suburbs and 36 percent in cities, with sizable rural and suburban gender gaps. And there's a gap by age; 59 percent of those younger than 40 disapprove of Trump on immigration, vs. 48 percent of those age 50 and older.

METHODOLOGY – This ABC News/Washington Post/Ipsos poll was conducted online via the probability-based Ipsos KnowledgePanel® April 18-22, 2025, in English and Spanish, among a random national sample of 2,464 adults. Partisan divisions are 30-30-29 percent, Democrats-Republicans-independents.

Results have a margin of [sampling error](#) of 2 percentage points, including the design effect. Error margins are larger for subgroups. Sampling error is not the only source of differences in polls.
