Topline Data Report - Monday, Oct. 27, 2014

This public opinion poll for the BBC was conducted Oct. 22-26, 2014, by landline and cellular telephone interviews with a random national sample of 1,002 U.S. adults. Results for the full sample have an error margin of plus or minus 3.5 percentage points.
